The 6th Century BCE: The Demise of the Iron Age Kingdoms in Transjordan

Abstract

The end of the Iron Age in Jordan saw the demise of the kingdoms of Ammon, Moab, and Edom, and with it, significant social, political, and economic transformations. And yet, the nature of these changes is not well understood. After more than a century of historical records during the 6th century BCE the historical record falls mostly silent. Similarly, from the archaeological record, while site abandonment and destructions indicate an overall pattern of decline, the nature of this transformation is not entirely transparent, and appears to vary by site and region into the Achaemenid period.

This workshop seeks to address this period of transformation around the 6th century BCE, namely, the nature of the demise of the kingdoms of Ammon, Moab, and Edom, and the new sociopolitical and economic patterns that followed in the Achaemenid period. The goal is to leverage recent archaeological fieldwork and inscriptional data, integrating it with new interpretations of older data. The presentations focus on recent archaeological findings, or new interpretations of existing data in an effort to draw together, on a wider scale, discussion that will seek to better understand this period.
