Abstract

The study of cross-cultural contacts cannot be set apart from an understanding of culture itself. V. G. Childe popularised the cultural-historical approach to archaeology, stating that a cultural group would largely manifest homogeneous markers. Therefore, elements typically associated with another culture would signify the presence of foreigners and/or trade. From the second half of the 2nd millennium BCE, the island of Cyprus was fully integrated into a broader Eastern Mediterranean network, resulting in a dramatic increase in foreign imports and the introduction of new technologies and iconography. The assimilation and/or adaptation of exogenous elements is visible in many aspects of the Cypriot material culture: ceramics, metallic artefacts, ivories, stone vases, cylinder seals, jewellery, terracottas, and stone sculpture. In return, Cypriot artefacts circulated widely throughout the Eastern Mediterranean. As a result, imitations and innovative productions inspired by Cypriot forms and motifs emerged, providing a much more complex and multifaceted picture of cultural interactions. Challenging our understanding of "cultural markers" and what can be considered as "local" or "foreign", the main aim of this workshop is to explore how cross-cultural contacts contributed to shaping the material cultures of the island of Cyprus and the neighbouring regions during the 2nd and 1st millennia BCE.
