Our proposed workshop aligns with the 7th theme, "Characterizing Culture" of the ICAANE conference. We aim to investigate how these interactions influenced the social, economic, and cultural evolution of ancient Iran. Ultimately, the workshop explores how connectivity contributed to the rich tapestry of the Iranian cultural legacy. To achieve this, we are not limiting ourselves to central cultural areas within modern Iran; instead, we have invited scholars who have studied the interactions between Persia and neighboring cultures.
