Abstract

The workshop aims to explore the archaeological record of Lebanon's interior regions from the Palaeolithic to Medieval times. Focusing on the plateaus, mountains, and inner valleys, this workshop will bring together researchers to examine the patterns of occupation and the strategies employed by ancient societies to inhabit these challenging landscapes. Participants will explore various aspects of ancient life, including social practices, resource management, trade networks, and settlement structures. Through presentations and discussions, the workshop will highlight recent findings and innovative research projects and surveys, that have advanced our understanding of these regions. Key topics vary from the adaptation of economy to mountainous terrains and valley ecosystems, the role of trade routes in connecting inland settlements with coastal cities, the strategic importance of settlements and the pattern of dispersal. New perspectives on the socio-economic and cultural dynamics of ancient Near Eastern societies are offered by examining the complexities of human habitation in Lebanon's hinterland.
