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Abstract

The Middle East has for many years suffered from tragic armed conflicts and natural disasters bringing cultural heritage in danger. Physical protection of archaeological monuments and sites is a necessary emergency action often however with only a short-termed effect. A long-termed solution requires involvement of the communities living in the areas of archaeological sites, the citizens of the nations where the archaeological sites are located today, as well the international community of scientists and the general public through sharing knowledge and education. This workshop will discuss approaches and methods of engaging children (but also as well adults) in archaeological work by catching their interest, inspiring fascination and building an appreciation for the past, and understanding how the past ties into the present and the future. Cases from the field, museums and beyond are presented and discussed.
