Identifying Local Ceramic Production in Northwestern Arabia

Abstract

Archaeological research in Northwestern Arabia has shown the importance of the region's ceramic traditions. Key oasis sites, like Qurayyah, Taymā and Hegra (Madīnat Dīl), have long benefited from sustained excavation efforts, yielding rich ceramic assemblages. However, recent years have witnessed a surge in archaeological activity in the southern part of Northwestern Arabia, particularly at Al-Ula and Khaybar. This renewed focus has shed new light on the ceramic repertoire of this previously understudied area.

In the framework of this workshop, our focus centers on understanding and identifying local ceramic production across Northwestern Arabia from its emergence to the Islamic period. We aim to explore the multi-faceted approaches used in this field. Established methods such as chrono-typology, quantitative analysis, Chaîne opératoire, stylistic and archaeometric (petrography and geochemistry) analyses have proven efficient in distinguishing local ceramics from imported ones. By examining the shape, manufacturing techniques, surface treatment, decoration, and function over time, we aim to define the characteristics of local production for each chronological period, potentially revealing cultural and technological shifts in the region's pottery traditions. Case studies from several sites will showcase the choice of techniques and their application in practice, providing valuable insights into local production and potentially aiding in the reconstruction of inter-site circulation in the region.

This workshop seeks to foster a focused collaborative discussion among ceramologists specializing in pottery in the Northwestern Arabian region. By utilizing excavation data supported by absolute dating, we aim to refine the ongoing debate on local ceramic production and define its characteristics and evolution over time.
