# Images in/as inscriptions. Figurative elements replacing cuneiform on Middle Bronze Age cylinder seals

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#### Abstract

Cylinder seals' pictorial and written contents are typically differentiated by form and function. However, seals from Middle Bronze Age Mesopotamia occasionally depict figurative elements (humans, animals, and hybrid beings) in inscription fields. Contemporaneous Syrian seal carvers created columns and rows of figures, heads, hands, and symbols, building upon but also developing pictorial traditions of the region further. Were these figures meant to reference, replace, or complement cuneiform writing? How does their occurrence and use compare between Syria, Assyria, and Babylonia? And what does this tell us about regionally concurrent and divergent visual communication strategies and artifact semantics more generally? This paper investigates these questions from a comparative perspective, using quantitative data created within the framework of the "Annotated Corpus of Ancient West Asian Imagery: Cylinder Seals" project (ACAWAI-CS).
